Date & Time: Thursday, February 16, 11:30 AM


Luncheon will be Buffet style, menu TBA

The speaker will be our own Emeriti Friend, **Patricia L. H. Black**, author of *Twillaby Pond*. In describing the poetry selections in the book, Patricia notes:





Twillaby Pond started out in imitation of Irish poets. I love the lilt in most of their poetry, echoing the lilt in their everyday speech, the turn of a clever phrase, the whole language bit. The first stanza of Twillaby Pond almost wrote itself, requiring just a few tweaks. One very important comment pointed out that my original "little, small pocks" skated a bit too close to a dread disease! Besides, "little, WEE pocks" is closer to my Irish target. To get back to the actual question, whenever I read the poem at workshops and open-mike sessions people said they could just see it as a children's book. Judging by the reaction to the actual book, I have to agree. I had originally thought children were my niche audience but on reflection I think grandparents are the audience. At readings, that's who say, "I want to read this book to my grandbabies!"

Patricia has taught English in Italy, was editor of Ohio University Publications, worked as a travel agent and drove a bookmobile. Now she writes poems, does beadwork, gardens, and edits academic papers for international students. She is a member of the Athens Poetry Group, the PentaPoets online poetry group, the Evening Poets, and the Ohio Poetry Association. Her poems have appeared in Common Threads and in the Ohio Poetry Association's juried anthology *Everything Stops and Listens*. She has been a featured reader in Ohio in Athens, Cincinnati, Columbus, Coshocton, Marion and Wooster.


In other business, **David Thomas** was elected to the position of Chair of the Elections Committee along with a round of applause to **John Howell** who had served in that position for a number of years.


Marty then introduced **Dr. Robert Demott**, Kennedy Distinguished Professor of English Emeritus, speaker for the meeting.



Demott recounted how he first became interested in the work of author John Steinbeck, writing a senior thesis on Steinbeck after reading in *Travels With Charley: In Search of America* about hurricane Donna, an experience with which he could identify. After a master's thesis on T.S. Elliot and a PhD dissertation on Thoreau, he noted that one thing led to another in the theme of, "We do not take a trip; a trip takes us", quoting from *Travels With Charley,* and leading to his in-depth research on Steinbeck especially what was happening behind the scenes such as Steinbeck's extensive journaling while also writing his novels. Demott has published 13 books on or about Steinbeck including his most recent, *Steinbeck's Imaginarium* published by the University of New Mexico Press in November 2022. ## **Compelling Points about John** Steinbeck's Writings


- America as a subject for sustained inquiry (America and Americans, Travels with Charley)
- Social conscience, situational moral/ethical bearing (In Dubious Battle, Of Mice and Men, The Red Pony, The Grapes of Wrath, The Pearl, East of Eden, The Winter of Our
- Tolerant, inclusive, humanistic values (Tortilla Flat, Of Mice and Men, The Grapes of Wrath, The Forgotten Village)
- Ecological, relational, holistic view of life (The Grapes of Wrath, Sea of Cortez, Cannery Row)

  Search for home and "family" (The Pearl, East of Eden)
- Belief in power of language to make people understand each
